History of the First Baptist Church of Judson

On September 14, 1883, a group of Christians worshipping at Lawrenceville School, Gregg County, Texas, met for the purpose of organizing a Baptist Church. Thirteen people obligated themselves financially to start a fund in order to build the church. They were F. M. Ponder, Hiram Whatley, W. N. Dickinson, E. Prewett, J. W. Lawrence, R. W. Persons, Davis Adrian, Judge Blackburn, J. W. Croft, E. E. Crain, Mrs. Lewis, and two anonymous donors.

The first pastor was W. B. Brewer (1883-1887). Silas A. Smart and A. E. Hiett were elected deacons September 9, 1885. Also in 1885, Mrs. Hiram Whatley recommended the church be named Judson in honor of Alabamian Adamaris Judson, Baptist Missionary to Burma in the 1840's. She was a member of a church with the same name in Eufala, Alabama, before her family moved to Texas in 1870.

Lawrenceville school was located on what is now known as the L. L. Mackey tract, Judson Community, Gregg County, Texas.

The above-mentioned parties deemed it necessary to organize the church, because there was no other church of like faith in their immediate neighborhood. In keeping with the principles of a Missionary Baptist Church, her government was that of a democratic nature, said members adopting through their Articles of Faith "that the governmental power is in the hands of the people; that the right of a majority of the members of their church should rule in accordance with the law of Christ, that the power of the church could not be alienated, and that church action was final." Judson Baptist Church also set forth as her Articles of Faith as those presented in J. M. Pendelton's original church manual.

During 1886-87 the church elected messengers to participate in matters of business during the annual gathering of sister churches at Association and District Meetings.

On Sunday, September 26, 1891, a committee composed of J. H. Newton, G. C. Renfro, and A. H. Crawford submitted to the church recommendations and specifications of a building in which to worship.

On April 22, 1893, a committee was chosen to select a site for the building of the church. Mr. and Mrs. Hiram Whatley responded by donating the plot of ground on which the church was built. The present building (1997) is located on the same plot.

On the third Sunday in July 1901, the body elected to organize a Sunday school.

On the first Sunday of November 1902, Sister Viola Stephens was elected to organize the Ladies Auxiliary. Miss Mary McLendon was elected President, Miss Eliza Smith, Vice President, Mrs. Vannie Fuller, Secretary, and Miss Effie Smith, Treasurer.

On April 1, 1922, a designated time for weekly prayer meetings was established.

The Baptist Young Peoples Training Union was organized on April 6, 1924.

On Sunday, October 6, 1935, the church dedicated a new church building containing the main auditorium and four classrooms.

On September 12, 1937, the church elected to begin half-time work, designating as its time for regular services the first and third Sundays and Sunday nights of each month.

On April 2, 1938, the sixth Sunday school class of the church school was organized.

On Sunday, December 2, 1939, the church voted to have one treasurer to handle all monies collected.

Judson Baptist Church elected to begin full-time pastorate work on December 7, 1941. The church has as its present membership (1997) 264.

A new sanctuary was built east of and adjoining the old sanctuary in 1960, and since then more land has been acquired.

At this time (1997), the church has been free of debt for several years.







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#### Articles of Faith

- I. We believe that the Holy Bible, written by men divinely inspired, and full of unmixed truth, is a perfect rule of faith and practice.
- II. We believe in one God-Father, Son and Holy Ghost.
- III. We believe that man, once holy, fell by voluntary transgression from that happy state, and is now utterly devoid of holiness.
- IV. We believe that sinners are saved by grace alone.
- v. We believe that men are justified by faith in the Lord-Jesus Christ.
- VI. We believe that salvation is free to all who will accept the Gospel.
- VII. We believe that, except as a man be renewed by the Holy Spirit, he is not qualified or prepared for the kingdom of Christ on earth, or to enjoy his glory hereafter.
- VIII. We believe that repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ are the duties of every one who hears the Gospel.
- IX. We believe that election is the eternal purpose of God, by which he graciously regenerates, sanctifies and saves sinners.
- X. We believe that sanctification, begun in regeneration, and ever progressive, is the process by which we are made to partake of God's holiness.
- XI. We believe in the preservation of the saints; that they are kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

- XII. We believe that God's law is the only, the eternal and unchangeable, rule of his church and moral government.
- XIII. We believe that a church of Christ is a congregation of baptized believers, united in the faith and fellowship of the Gospel, observing the ordinances and obeying the laws of Christ, and that its officers are pastors and deacons.
- XIV. We believe that Christian baptism is the immersion of a believer, in water, by a properly qualified administrator, into the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Ghost.
- XV. We believe that only such as have been properly baptized and received into the fellowship of a regularly organized Baptist Church, should partake of the Lord's Supper.
- XVI. We believe that the Lord's day or Christian Sabbath should be devoutly observed and sacredly devoted to religious services.
- · XVII. We believe that civil government is of divine appointment, and that the governors of States and nations should be obeyed, when the laws they seek to enforce are not in conflict with the Gospel.
- $\mathbf{X} \overline{\mathbf{V}} \mathbf{H} \mathbf{I} \mathbf{I}$  . We believe in the future resurrection of the dead.
- XIX. We believe in the final judgment; and that, in that day, the righteous and wicked will be separated forever.
- XX. We believe that the righteous will be made happy forever in heaven, and the wicked miserable forver in hell.

#### Church Covenant

Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith, having been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now in the presence of God. angels, and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another, as one body in Christ.

We engage therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love; to strive for the advancement of this Church in knowledge, holiness, and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline and doctrines to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the Church and the relief of the poer, and the spread of the Gospel through all nations.

We also engage to maintain family and secret devotions; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our department; to avoid all tattling, back biting and excessive anger; to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage, and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Saviour.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in prayer; to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy of speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Savior to secure it without delay.

We moreover engage that when we remove from this place, we will as soon as possible unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of this covenant and the principles of God's word.

This is the Church Covenant taken from Pendleton's "Church Manual."

#### Rules of Order

- I. The pastor, or in his absence any member appointed, shall act as Moderator of all business meetings of the church.
- II. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to keep order; and in case the Church is equally divided on any question, he shall give the casting vote.
- III. The meeting shall be opened and closed with prayer.
  - IV. The order of business shall be:
    - 1. Reading of minutes of previous meeting.
    - 2. The reception of members by experience or letter.
    - 3. Granting letters of dismission.
    - 4. Reports of committees.
    - 5. Unfinished business.
    - 3. New or miscellaneous business.
- V. A motion before the church must be disposed of before another motion can be entertained, unless the motion be to amend, postpone, adjourn, or call for the previous question.
- VI. The Moderator may speak on any question by calling on any brother to preside in his place.
- VII. Every member who speaks shall rise and first address the Moderator.
- VIII. The church in conference shall entertain no proposition for discussion which has not been presented on motion of one member and seconded by another.
- 1X. On any point of order a member may appeal from the Moderator to the church, whose decision shall be final.
- X. All questions, except that on reception of members, shall be decided by the vote of a majority.

Dear Cynthia:

The enclosed application is for an old church in a community north of Longview, Gregg County. Not until I studied the brief enclosed brief history did I realize that many of the early prominent families of Longview were members of this church. It has never had a large congregation, a Missionary Baptist Church very dedicated to fundamentals as seen in their Church Covenant. The church has had thirty-nine pastors with the most recent pastor now going to another church. It seems to have a solid core of about one hundred twenty members.

Wes Whatley is a retired teacher from the Longview Independent School District. His ancestors figured prominently in the organization and development of this church.

#### History of the First Baptist Church of Judson Judson, Texas

Lawrenceville School was used as a place of worship by many Christians in the 1870's in northern Gregg County. Many who attended were of the Baptist Faith. Around 1880 thirteen people obligated themselves financially to start a fund in order to build a Baptist Church. They were: F. M. Ponder, Hiram Whatley, W. N. Dickinson, E. Prewett, J. W. Lawrence, R. W. Persons, Davis Adrian, Judge Blackburn, J. W. Croft, E. E. Crain, Mrs. Lewis, and two anonymous donors. They pledged \$25.50 and 500 board feet of lumber¹.

Judson Baptist Church was officially organized on September 14, 1883². W. B. Brewer (1883-1887) was the first Elder. Silas A. Smart and A. E. Hiett were elected Deacons September 9, 1885. Mr. and Mrs. R. D. Smith and Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Renfro were charter members. That same year the church was named Judson upon the recommendation of Mrs. Hiram (Georgia) Whatley³. She had been a member of Judson Baptist Church in Lawrenceville, Alabama, before her family moved to Texas in 1870.

Adoniram Judson (1788-1850) was America's first foreign missionary. He was born in Massachusetts, graduated from Brown University, and studied for the ministry at Andover Seminary where he became a member of a foreign mission interest group⁴. He and his wife Ann sailed for India in 1812 as Congregationalist missionaries, but embraced the Baptist point of view on baptism while aboard ship. While in Burma, he was imprisoned for two years under dreadful conditions accused of being a British spy. He later translated the English Bible into

Burmese, produced an English to Burmese/Burmese to English dictionary and composed much literature. He was a master at training evangelists and pastors informally. He served for 38 years as a foreign missionary in Burma⁵.

The charter members felt it necessary to organize the church since there was no other church of like faith in their immediate neighborhood. In keeping with the principles of a Missionary Baptist Church, her government was of a democratic nature, said members adopting through their Articles of Faith and Rules of Order, "that the governmental power is in the hands of the people; that the right of a majority of members should rule in accordance with the law of Christ; that the power of the church could not be alienated; and that church action was final." Judson Baptist Church adopted the 20 Articles of Faith as presented in J. M. Pendleton's original church manual⁶. They continued to meet at Lawrenceville School until early 1894.

During 1886-87 the church elected messengers to participate in matters of business during the annual gathering of sister churches at Association (Baptist Missionary Association) and District meetings⁷.

On Sunday, September 26, 1891, a committee composed of J. H. Newton, G. C. Renfro, and A. H. Crawford submitted to the Church recommendations and specifications of a building in which to worship. The House of Worship would be 43 feet long and 32 feet wide, frame structure, walls 12 feet high, stand north and south, three windows on east and west sides, two windows on north and south ends with windows being 12"x 16". There would be two rows of seats, eight feet long on each side of the church with the middle row being 10 feet long.

R. E. Attlesey, A. H. Crawford, G. C. Renfro, S. A. Smart, and sisters Nobie Page and Mrs. Hiram (Georgia) Whatley were to solicit contributions⁸.

On April 22, 1893, a committee was chosen to select a site for the building of the church. Mr. and Mrs. Hiram Whatley responded by donating a one-acre tract of land on which the church was built⁹. The church was completed in less than one year. The present building is located on the same plot of land.

On October 26, 1894, County Judge J. T. Smith appointed Hiram Whatley as presiding officer, and designated "Judson Courthouse" as the place designated by law as the voting place of Precinct 2, Gregg County, Texas, for the General Election November 6, 1894¹⁰.

Judson Baptist Church is located 6.4 miles north of downtown Longview on Judson Road (Spur 502) and west 1.0 mile on FM Road 1844 (Seven Pines Road).

The oak trees still stand in front of the church with some showing small bulges on the trunk where hitching rings (used to tie horses and mules) had been driven in the trunk more than 100 years ago¹¹.

Since there was no baptistry, baptismal services were conducted in the creek east of the church (creek was dug out), later in the Will Fuller Pond (two miles west of church on Highway 1844), and later Whitehurst Lake (road junction of Judson Road and Highway 259). Services were usually conducted once a year, after the summer revival¹². Many years there were thirty or more candidates for Baptism, and after tiring the pastor was assisted by male church members¹³.

During the summer the church held one or more week long singing schools. People of all ages learned many techniques of singing one of which was the Sacred Harp singing style, and were taught how to read shaped notes, line out a melody, develop a pattern of leading, and how to dictate pitch by raising and lowering of the director's hand. On Sunday after the singing school, the church held an "all day singing and dinner on the ground." Most of Gregg County's better singers were a product of small church singing schools¹⁴.

The early members of Judson Baptist were mostly farmers, God-fearing, hard working, good citizens, loved their country, helped each other in times of need, and their word was their bond¹⁵. They met in Conference on Saturday, 7:00 p.m. before the fourth Sabbath of each month¹⁶. Church business was conducted at this time. The question was always asked if any member "had not lived up to duty" during the past month. If a member stated that he or she had not, and asked for forgiveness, all was forgiven. If a member reported seeing another member "not living up to duty," a committee was appointed to investigate the charges and reported back the next month. Opportunity was given for the member to acknowledge the unchristian conduct. All was forgiven if the person asked for forgiveness. The person who did not come forward and make acknowledgements was dismissed from the church. Unchristian conduct included: dancing, allowing dancing in the home, drinking, selling or making liquor, heresy (joining another denomination), and nonattendance. A male member could not be absent more than two consecutive Conferences without consent of the moderator (pastor)¹⁷.

Judson Baptists have always supported foreign missions. The most noteworthy period was 1886-1902 when one-half of church tithes and offerings went to foreign missions¹⁸.

Shortly before 1900 Hiram A. "Gus" Whatley gave one acre of land immediately west of the church for a cemetery¹⁹. No cedar trees were to be planted, only magnolias and other evergreens²⁰. The cemetery has been enlarged since then with Ernest Holland and Elmer E. Stone giving one-half acres, each, to the Church²¹.

It is evident by looking at the grave markers in the cemetery that the men of the church answered the Call to Arms during armed conflict—Confederate veterans, veterans of World War I, World War II, Korea, and Vietnam are buried there. Many members of the church are veterans.

With the church growing and in keeping with the Church Covenant to "religiously educate our children²², the body elected to organize a Sunday School in July 1901²³.

On the first Sunday in November 1902, Sister Viola Stephens was elected to organize the Ladies Auxiliary. Miss Mary McLendon was elected President; Miss Elija Smith, Vice President; Mrs. Vannie Fuller, Secretary; and Miss Effie Smith, Treasurer²⁴.

On April 1, 1922, a time for weekly prayer meetings was established. They began each Sunday evening at  $7:30^{25}$ .

The Baptist Young Peoples Training Union (B.Y.P.U.) was organized on April 6, 1924.

Four Group Captains and a Quiz Leader were named²⁶. On June 9-11, 1941, Judson Baptist Church was the host church for the Annual State B.Y.P.U. Convention. More than 150 messengers and visitors attended. The Ladies Auxiliary had the task of cooking meals, washing/hand drying more than 450 plates, 1,200 knives, forks, and spoons each day²⁷.

The farmers in this area struggled to make a living in the 1920's due to falling cotton prices. Then came the stock market crash on October 29, 1929, that helped bring on the Great Depression. The 1930's was a period of high unemployment, low wages, and bank failures. Many lost entire savings. And yet, church members saw the need to build a new church. A finance committee composed of Lorene Hamby, Lois Mattox, Robert McLendon, and J. E. McKnight was responsible for raising funds for the new church building. The building was completed in late summer 1935. It was dedicated on Sunday, October 6, 1935. The morning dedication sermon was preached by Elder C. L. Cameron, and the afternoon sermon by Elder O. F. Barton. It contained the main auditorium, and four classrooms²⁸.

The church began full-time pastoral work on a day church members will always remember—the day was December 7, 1941. Elder B. E. Petty (1940-45) began full-time work. Two ordained ministers were members of the church, Elder H. L. Bruner and J. C. Harrell²⁹.

Active deacons in 1941 were: I. S. McLendon, Chairman of the Board; A. C. McAfee, Treasurer; Knox Smith, Charles Mattox, Ray Sparks, J. E. McKnight, Emmett Whitehurst, John Callaway, Jim Landers, and Bill Slater. Mrs. A. C. McAfee had been serving as Church Clerk since September 1924³⁰.

Since 1941 the Church has purchased several more acres adjoining the original acre tract, and has purchased additional cemetery space³¹.

A new sanctuary was built in 1958 adjoining the old sanctuary. The old sanctuary was bricked with matching bricks. The debt was paid off in 1960.

For a number of years the church remained debt free. However, church members were active in mission support. They started a mission church, the Liberty Baptist Church on Loop 281, and support a mission church in Chicago. They also support the following: Baptist Encampment at Gary, Jacksonville Baptist College, local and foreign missions, Baptist Home for Children at Waxahachie, and the Baptist Missionary Alliance Seminary. The church presently has 264 members, with 112 who are active³².

In 1997 a new Fellowship Hall was started, and will be completed in early 1998. Church members have done all of the work, and it is paid for³³.

Present Deacons are: Ernie Gallaway, Chairman; Seborn Smith, Jerry Long, Johnny Steed, Thomas McAfee, Gene Freeman, and Harold Stone³⁴.

Since its humble beginning in 1883, Judson Baptist Church has seen the community, seven miles north of Longview, become known as Judson. Before 1900, Lawrenceville School became Judson School. (Later Omega, Alpine, Tryon, and Winterfield schools consolidated with Judson.)

On December 8, 1952, Judson Post Office opened³⁵. State Highway north from Longview became known as Judson Road long ago. There are several businesses with the name

of Judson, a Judson Plaza, and a Judson Lions Club. Adoniram Judson, America's first foreign missionary, sailed to India in 1812 never to know that a church would be named for him in a small community seven miles north of Longview, Texas in 1885, and a growing community named Judson has emerged.

#### FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF JUDSON

IN THE 1870s THE PEOPLE OF THIS COMMUNITY MET IN THE LAWRENCE-VILLE SCHOOL FOR CHRISTIAN WORSHIP SERVICES. THIRTEEN LOCAL BAPTISTS ORGANIZED THEIR OWN CHURCH IN 1883, CONTINUING TO MEET IN THE SCHOOL BUILDING. FOUNDING MEMBER GEORGIA WHATLEY SUGGESTED THE NAME JUDSON MISSIONARY BAPTIST CHURCH FOR A CHURCH SHE HAD ATTENDED IN LAWRENCEVILLE, ALABAMA WHICH WAS NAMED IN HONOR OF ADONIRAM JUDSON (1788-1850), AMERICA'S FIRST FOREIGN MISSIONARY. MEMBERS BEGAN TO PLAN FOR THEIR OWN HOUSE OF WORSHIP IN 1891. GEORGIA AND HIRAM WHATLEY DONATED A PLOT OF LAND, AND THE STRUCTURE WAS ERECTED IN 1894. BAPTISMAL SERVICES WERE CONDUCTED IN THE CREEK EAST OF THE CHURCH AFTER THE YEARLY SUMMER REVIVAL HAD TAKEN PLACE. THE BAPTISMS LATER WERE HELD ON A MEMBER'S PROPERTY AND THEN AT NEARBY WHITEHURST LAKE. IN THE LATE 1890s H. A. WHATLEY GAVE ONE ACRE FOR A CEMETERY. SUNDAY SCHOOL BEGAN IN 1901, A LADIES' AUXILIARY WAS FORMED IN 1902, AND THE BAPTIST YOUNG PEOPLE'S UNION WAS ORGANIZED AT THE JUDSON CHURCH IN 1924. A NEW CHURCH BUILDING WAS ERECTED IN 1935, AND THE CHURCH WAS ABLE TO HIRE ITS FIRST FULL-TIME PASTOR IN 1941. BY 1900 PUBLIC SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 2, GREGG COUNTY, WAS KNOWN AS JUDSON. IN 1952 A U. S. POST OFFICE OPENED IN THE COMMUNITY, TAKING THE NAME JUDSON.

## Marker to detail history of First Baptist Church of Judson

he tens of thousands of Longview-area residents who drive Judson Road each day probably don't know it, but they are traveling a road with links to America's first missionary, Adoniram Judson, who lived from 1788-

The road leads to the Judson community, named for the First Baptist Church of Judson, which in turn was named in honor of the missionary, Wesley Whatley said.

Whatley, a retired school administrator, has spent the past year or so researching the history of the church and the community. He has strong ties to the area: His great-grandfather, Hiram Whatley, donated land in 1894 to build the first church, and his greatgrandmother, Georgia Whatley, suggested the name Judson.

Whatley's efforts will bear fruit at 1:30 p.m. March 21 when a new historical marker outlining the history of the church and community will be dedicated.

"The church is deserving of one, and it's the only church in Texas, to my knowledge, that was named in honor of America's first missionary," he said.

"I'm honored to have a small part in that. I think the man is deserving of recognition," said Whatley, who examined church and county records to gather information for the historical marker.

"The man must have been brilliant," he said of Judson, who grew up in Massachusetts, graduating from Brown University and studying for the ministry at Andover Seminary.

Judson and his wife, Ann, left Massachusetts for India in 1812 as Congregationalist missionaries, Whatley said. However, while sailing to India, they became believers in the total immersion way of baptism and so became Baptist missionaries.

Judson was imprisoned for two years in Burma after he was accused of being a British spy. He later translated the English Bible into Burmese and produced an English/Burmese and Burmese/English dictionary.

He served as a Baptist missionary and was a master teacher

training evangelists in India and Burma for 38 years. Whatley said.

Whatley's great-grandparents moved from Alabama to East Texas, to what would become Judson. in 1870, he said.

"Hiram Whatley "farmed and was Lawrenceville, Ala., before her a schoolteacher in the Lawrenceville School, Georgia Whatley was a homemaker. They had a number of children, and many of their descendants still live in this area," Whatley said.

Thirteen Baptists in the area formed a church Sept. 14, 1883. Whatley said. His greatgrandfather was part of that

group. That same year, his greatgrandmother suggested they name the church Judson Baptist Church in honor of the missionary, he said.

Georgia Whatley had belonged to Judson Baptist Church in family moved to Texas, Whatley said.

"I just feel real strong that those people sacrificed a lot. They formed that church during the Panic of 1883," when times were hard, he said. The original members pledged \$25.50 in cash and 500 board feet of lumber to provide financial resources for the church,

Whatley said.

The Baptists in the area met at the Lawrenceville School; they didn't vet have a church building, he said.

So. in 1894, Hiram Whatley donated an acre of land for a church building, Whatley said.

"My grandfather, Hiram Augustus (Whatley), gave an acre of land for the (church) cemetery, sometime before 1900," he said.

In 1935, church members again sacrificed to build a second church building, although it was the depths of the Great Depression. Whatley said.

Their sacrifice and dedication just shows their commitment to God, he said.

"The people of East Texas now will know how Judson community got its name. Everything comes from the church. It's all in honor of Adoniram Judson," Whatley said.

"I'm just grateful now that he will get a little recognition." he said.

The dedication ceremony will be in front of the church and will be led by the church's pastor, the Rev. Marvin Wittenburg, and Gregg County historian Dr. Norman Black.
