One of the most unique homes in Longview has been selected as the first Showhouse - the splendid Victorian Northcutt Home located at 313 South Fredonia. The home, built in 1902 by Dr. and Mrs. W. D. Northcutt, was the first in Gregg County to be listed on the National Register of Historic Places and has received a marker from the Texas Historical Commission. Local designers have decorated and furnished the various rooms of the home, keeping in mind the early 1900's while preserving and enhancing the architectural features of the residence, now owned by the Edward A. Brown family.

You are cordially invited to attend the opening ceremony of the Christmas Showhouse at 2:30 p.m. on Sunday, November 30, 1986. At this time the Gregg County Historical Commission will dedicate the Historical Marker. A Preview Party of the Showhouse will follow from 3 p.m. until 5 p.m. High tea will be served.





As Executive Director of Hospice Longview, I would like to take this opportunity to thank the many dedicated people who have worked for so many long hours preparing for our major fundraiser... Christmas Showhouse '86. It is an inspiration to all of us at the Hospice office to see the dedication and tireless energy of Kathryn Reagan, Lee Allbritton, Risa Harris and all the volunteers committed to providing funding for Hospice care in our community in 1987.

As I searched for the words I wanted to say for this column in this Showhouse issue of "The Dove", I realized it would be pretty easy for me to end up sounding like a preacher. Lee Allbritton General Chairman Christmas Showhouse 1986 double-galleried bays and the dome-like turret are instances of a stylistic expression which has been called Queen Anne, another name to add to the confused array of subdivisions within the Victorian style. The asymmetric central portico is flanked on one side by a bold, turreted double-circular porch and on the other by a double gallery which wraps around the corner of the house. The light columnar galleries are surmounted by a triple-triangle gable centered by a double window set in a shingle-style pediment. Each of the three triangles is centered by an ornately carved circular medallion.

The construction of the Northcutt House was begun in the summer of 1900 for Dr. William Davis Northcutt and his family. Dr. Northcutt had built a house for his bride, Eda Mauthe, in 1886 when they married. This house, located at 309 South Fredonia Street, was soon too small for the Northcutts' growing family, and the new house was built on three 50-foot lots next door to the original house. Dr. Northcutt purchased these lots in the late 1890s and engaged the services of the Reverend W. B. Allen, minister of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Longview at that time, as architect. The house was completed in the Spring of 1902 at a cost of \$12,000. Unique features of the interior of the house include the ornately carved main staircase paneled with East Texas Curley Pine, now extinct, and the 16' x 16' upstairs bathroom historically acknowledged as the first indoor bathroom in Longview.

The historic Northcutt House was the first building in Gregg County to be listed on the National Register of Historic Places and has received a marker from the Texas Historical Commission.

Although the Northcutt House is a significant part of Longview's architectural history, the man who built the house, Dr. William Davis Northcutt, is more important to the development of Longview.

Dr. Northcutt moved to Longview as a child in 1870 with his parents from Georgia. He attended McClelland's Boarding School and Texas A & M and received his medical degree from the University of Louisville Medical Department in Louisville, Kentucky. He returned to Longview and practiced medicine for 43 years until his death on November 20, 1931.

During those years, he served as mayor of Longview for four terms, chief of the Volunteer Fire Department, county and city health officer; was elected to the school board; and was appointed local physician and surgeon for the Santa Fe, T&P and IG&N Railroads. He was a member of the Texas and American Medical Associations, Masons and a charter member of Longview Rotary Club.

The seven Northcutt children reared in the home were Dolly, Leon Davis, Emma Kathryn, Flossie (Mrs. William Ridley Wheeler), William Davis, Jr., Eda and Jessie (Mrs. Edward Anthen Brown).

Their descendants include 10 grandchildren – Barbara Frances Wheeler, Ridley Northcutt Wheeler (deceased), William Fisher Northcutt (deceased), Dr. William Davis Northcutt, Ill, Joseph LeGrande Northcutt, Arthur Northcutt Brown (deceased), George Melville Brown, Barbara Anthen Brown Munford (Mrs. Robert), Betty Yarnell Brown (deceased), Bruce Edward Brown; 12 great-grandchildren – Sarah Northcutt Wheeler Magee (Mrs. William), Nancy Howard Wheeler Heller (Mrs. Robert), William Davis Northcutt, IV, Walter Ridley Northcutt, Frances Evelyn Compton (Cissy) Northcutt, LeGrande Sandberg Northcutt, Gordon LeGrande Northcutt, Aurelia Northcutt, Kathryn Suzanne Brown, David Northcutt Brown, Emily Ruth Brown, Alan Ridley Brown; and four great-great-grandchildren – William Ridley Wheeler Magee and Dean Flagg Magee, sons of Mr. and Mrs. William Magee of Dallas, and Ridley Mathias Heller and Andrew Howard Heller, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Heller of San Antonio.

is to provide home care and support for terminally ill patients and their families. The program strives to improve the quality of life of its patients and to help them live as fully as possible within the limitations of their illness.

This special kind of care has been available in the Longview area since early 1986. Terminally ill patients receive expert medical care while they and their families receive essential emotional and spiritual support. Hospice Longview has shown its ability to provide appropriate, competent and compassionate care to the terminally ill. Under the hospice concept, the Hospice Longview program has a team of physicians, nurses, social workers, pharmacists, psychological and spiritual counselors and community volunteers...all trained to assist the hospice patient. The team works together to care for patients and their families, especially helping them cope with their pain and grief. These dedicated people help the patient and family to celebrate time, not merely mark it.

The master bedroom is a reflection of the style in which the house was constructed, a combination of the Victorian period and Eclectic period. This time period witnessed a rapid succession of confused style revivals which were nonreflective of their times and were impurely applied. The rich, complementary color scheme consists of teal green and brick red with accents of ivory lace.

Authentic Eighteenth Century designs were selected for the furnishings, the purity of proportion and unity of these designs make these pieces compatible with the Victorian period.

The window serves as the focal point in the room and is treated with swags and jabots and accented with tassel tiebacks.

In an effort to retain as much authenticity as possible, the mirrored mantel was left in its original state.



A Victorian Christmas card comes to life with rich colors of the fabric-covered walls. The walls are accented by the usage of ecru lace on the ceiling. Repeating the theme from the walls is the pine floor with its mauve border and blue centered area stenciled throughout with cranberry ribbons. 

An indoor bathroom at the turn of the century was one of the "show" rooms of the house. Only the affluent could afford indoor plumbing.

Perhaps this room, the first indoor bathroom in Longview, was embellished as reflected here today. Let's step back in time and try to imagine what a real convenience it was to have running water, both hot and cold, a large installed tub, sink and inside commode.

The rich colors of reds, blues and rose tones with touches of lace along with Eclectic furnishings and stained glass windows depict the romantic days of yesteryear.

Telltale remnants remain from those days before indoor plumbing as shown by the chamber pot tucked in an out- of-the-way place.

The handmade Victorian night dress might have been dropped as milady hurried from the room.





The landscape has been renovated with plants commonly available during the Victorian period, such as holly, nandina, ivy and photinia. Large shrubs complement the entry porch and steps at the culmination of the new brick walk made from red bricks found on site.
