This history of O. H. Methvin has previously been documented and accepted by the Texas Historical Commission on the occasion of the placement of an official Texas Historical marker on the grounds of the Gregg County Courthouse in Longview, Texas.

On April 7, 1870, O. H. Methvin and wife, Margaret R. Methvin, deeded 100 acres to the Southern Pacific Railway for the sum of one dollar (\$1.00) for the purpose of laying their line, and opening up and developing the resources of the county. This land was in the Hamilton McNutt Survey, and was situated in Upshur County at that time but it later became a part of Gregg County in 1873. The deed was filed on July 15, 1872, recorded in Volune 0, page 672 in Deed Records of Upshur County. The deed was later recorded in Gregg County, Volume 59, page 301 in Deed Records of Gregg County.

We have, in our family, the original deed signed by O. H. Methvin, dated April 7, 1870.

We do not know the full name of O. H. Methvin, since he always signed it with only his initials. Records of several deeds listing him as O. H. Methvin have been found. His son, O. H. Jr. is listed as Ossamus on the census records, therefore, we believe his name was Ossamus Hitch Methvin.

O. H. Methvin was born March 10, 1815, in Lowndes County, which later became Baldwin County, Georgia. He was the son of Richard R. Methvin, who was the son of Nathan Methvin, the first Methvin to come to America from Edinburgh, Scotland in 1790.

Richard R. Methvin and his son, O. H. Methvin, Sr. came to Texas about 1848 and settled in Upshur County. On microfilm of the National Archives Library, the 1850 census of Upshur County lists Richard R. Methvin, age 56, born in Maryland; O. H. Methvin. age 35, born in Georgia; Margaret R. Methvin, age 32, born in Georgia. Margaret was the wife of O. H. Methvin, and they had three sons born in Texas. They are listed in the 1860 census of Upshur County as Alexander, age 10 years; Ossamus, age 8 years and Jefferson, age 7 years.

O. H. Methvin bought many acres of land, reported to be 1200 acres ub East Texas and farmed part of the land. Joseph Mark Sparkman came to this area in the 1860's, and he said the first person he met was O. H. Methvin plowing his cornfield where the courthouse now stands. This land was in the Hamilton McNutt Survey of Upshur County, and was granted by patent from the State of Texas in 1848. It was originally owned by James Earp.

In April 1870, O. H. Methvin and a railroad surveyor were standing on the porch of Methvin's home on Rock Hill looking out over the land. The surveyor exclaimed, "My, what a long view you have from here!" Methvin replied, "That's it! We'll name the new town Longview, and I'll deed you the land for it."

The Gregg County Courthouse is located on a portion of the land that was donated for the founding of Longview. On February 29, 1984, a Texas Historical marker, sponsored by descendants of O. H. Methvin, was unveiled on the grounds of of the courthouse.

Printed in the foreword of the Longview Telephone Directory it stated: "Longview was founded in 1870, by O. H. Methvin, incorporated in 1871, and became the county seat of Gregg County in 1873." This statement can be found in directories dated 1964, 1967, 1969, 1970, and 1971.

The final resting place of O. H. Methvin is in Green-wood Cemetery in Longview, Texas, under a large, very old cedar tree. His grave is marked by a granite stone reading O. H. Methvin, Born March 10, 1815 - Died February 9, 1882. We, as descendants, feel, this being the Sesquicentennial of Texas, this gravesite of this early Texas pioneer, deserves this honor of placing a Texas Historical marker to commemorate the founder of Longview.
