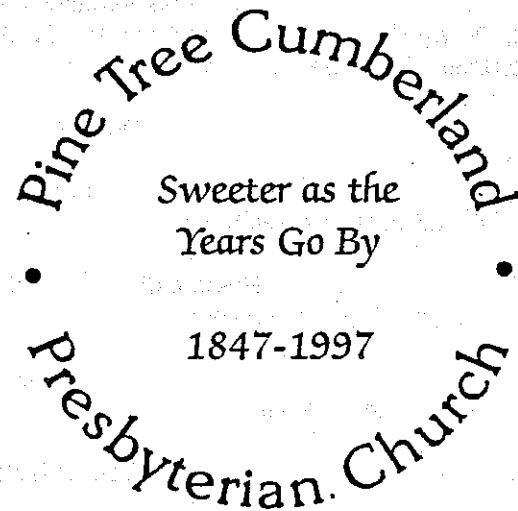

The Pine Tree Cumberland Presbyterian Church at 1805 Pine Tree Road is the oldest church in Gregg County, having been organized on October 10, 1847, and also holds the distinction of being one of the oldest protestant Churches in the state that is yet serving.

This congregation was officially organized under the ministry of the Rev. Solomon Awalt. The Church was named ^{after} for a great Pine Tree, now removed, under which the congregation met for the service.

A log house was built immediately for the purpose of worship and for education of the children of the community. In 1858, the log Church was razed and replaced by a hexagon-shaped building which stood for seventy-four years, and a school building was constructed. In 1932, a brick building replaced the former frame structure, providing seating in the sanctuary for approximately 300, nine Sunday School rooms, pastor's study, youth assembly room, and a kitchen; this was dedicated debt-free on December 11, 1932. A manse was built on the property shortly thereafter. Then in 1947, all facilities were redecorated and improved, leading up to the building of the present Educational Building in 1950. The Church facilities are equipped with modern conveniences, improvements being added as the need is indicated.

A program of spiritual nurture for all ages and groups is maintained by the Church, and is flexible in order that changing needs of the people and community might be met.

The Pine Tree Church fully supports presbyterial, synodic, and denominational programs, including a strong emphasis on home and foreign missions. The tenor of the Church is marked by an evangelistic appeal in the atmosphere of formal worship. The point of emphasis in the doctrine of the Church is on the rewarding and abundant life that can be found in the service and faith of Jesus Christ.

The Pine Tree Cumberland Presbyterian congregation has grown with the community. It was third in additions as compared to other Churches of its denomination in Texas Synod, which includes Texas, Louisiana, New Mexico, and California. It is anticipated that it will be first in additions in 1966, having received 52 members during the first seven months of this year. No new construction is planned at the present, although a committee is making a study of the Church's physical needs for a projected five-year period. Morning worship has reached near capacity attendance, and it is expected that a second morning service will be added within a few months to accommodate the worshipers.

Physical improvements during the first half of 1966 include installation of new screens on the manse property and insulation of the ceiling; painting and repair of all outside trim; addition of an entry and storage room at the rear of the Church; refinishing of sanctuary window-protectors; and completion of projects begun in 1965, including complete redecorating and furnishing ^{of} the pastor's study.

The present minister of the congregation, ^{the} R. v. Paul H. Allen, will complete his third year at Pine Tree on the first Sunday in December. He is also serving at the present time as moderator of Texas Synod; as a member of the Synodic Board of Finance; and as president of the Presbyterial Board of Missions. He is a Master Mason.

The local Church is governed by ruling elders who are elected for three-year ~~xxxx~~ terms, three being elected each May. Ruling elders are responsible for the program and spiritual nurture program and activity of the Church. Those serving at the present time include Otis Fisher; George Homer; Wayne Smith; F. K. Schanley, who is also treasurer; Tom Everett, assistant treasurer; Richard Haynie; Jack Johnson, Edwin Linn; and Gerald Brelsford.

Deacons are organized under the direction of the ruling elders and are responsible primarily for the physical and temporal concerns of the Church and its benevolences. Elections are held on the same basis as for ruling elders. ~~xxxx~~ The Serving Deacons at the present time are Joe Alexander; Timothy Hayes; W. A. Rogers; E. F. Jacobs; H. M. Nuss, who is also the chairman of the board; Don Johnson; T. M. Mitchell; E. C. Jackson, Jr., who is clerk; Winston A Morris; and James Hough.

The congregation is organized into committees whose activities are subject to approval by the ruling elders. Active committees in the congregation are Benevolence; Costumes and Pageantry; Evangelism and Visitation; Communion; Altar; Library; Decorating and Kitchen; Fellowship; Missions; and Christian Education. A Board of Ushers is also maintained, with George Homer as its chairman.

Organizational and service activities in the Church include the program of the CPW (Women of the Church); the Men's Fellowship; the Chancel and Vesper Choirs; the Crusaders (children) and Youth Fellowships; the Scout Troop 619.

Regardless of an individual's talent, the Pine Tree Cumberland Presbyterian Church proposes to provide opportunity for its utility in the service Of Jesus Christ. Each person is frequently reminded that the "chief end of men is to glorify God and to enjoy him forever."
