Council Hears Progress Report

A progress report on construction of the new low-rent housing projects was made to members of the City Council Tuesday night by Woodrow Wood of the local Housing Authority.

The new units are being erected on two different sites: Site No. 1 is located west of Tenery between Pacific and Quitman and Site No. 2 is south of Erwin's Handy Dandy Grocery on the west side of Tyler Highway.

Although rainy weather has prevailed since construction got underway 96 days ago, Wood said contractor Howard Hall is almost on schedule and making good progress.

Framing has already started at Site No. 1 and pouring of the concrete slabs at Site 2.

Wood explained the daily, weekly and monthly progress reports which must be forwarded to Public Housing Administration in Fort Worth. He complimented Lewis Jones for his excellent work as inspector for the architect.

Call Public Hearing

The council, meeting in regular session, called a Public Hearing for Thursday, May 17th to consider proposed changes in the zoning ordinance.

The changes to be considered include reclassification of part of the Red Rock area from Class E to Class G; an establishing minimum housing requirements for Class F (700 sq. feet) and Class G (600 sq. feet).

The Council set the Public Hearing after the changes had been recommended by the Planning Commission.

Lewis Jones, representing the Babe Ruth Baseball League, asked and received permission to construct a concession stand at the ball park.

Demos, GOPs Will Have Separate Primary Elections Here Saturday

For the first time since 1952, both Democrats and Republicans will have separate primary elections in Glade Water. The Democrats will have two voting boxes, the Republicans one.

Citizens may vote in only one of these primary elections. Their poll tax receipts will be stamped either Democrat or Republican, at the primary where they vote. These receipts will serve as identification at their precinct conventions.

Both parties will have separate precinct conventions on Saturday to elect delegates to the county conventions of both parties on May 12 in Longview.

Judge Samuel C. Harris, chairman of the Democratic executive committee of Precinct 3, today issued a call for the precinct convention to be held at 4 p.m. Saturday in the city court room of the Glade Water City Hall.

The precinct convention will elect delegates for the county convention which will meet in the Seventy-First District court room on the third floor of the Gregg County Courthouse in Longview at 10 a.m. Saturday, May 12.

Democrats will have two voting boxes for their primary here Saturday. Box 1 will be at the fire station with Wilson Godfrey as presiding judge, and Johnny Osteen and Raymond Allen as election judges. They will name their workers.

Box 2 at Broadway School gym will have Judge Harris as presiding judge, and H. D. Victory and Les Long as election judges.

Polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. All voters are requested to bring their poll tax receipts in voting, because no person can attend the convention unless his poll tax is stamped "Democrat" and "voted."

Generate Your Own—Electricity, That Is

HOUSTON (UPI)—Oil and natural gas companies hope to compete directly with electrical companies by developing means for individual homes and businesses to generate their own electricity.

The individual power plants would use natural gas for fuel. Officials of the Southern Gas Association and the American Gas Association, holding a joint conference in Houston, Tuesday discussed three methods now under development.

One is the fuel cell, a small device that can be tucked away in a basement, carport or garage and would make the home

independent of outside sources of electricity.

The other two methods are the thermoelectric and thermionic generators... and can be adopted for use in the home to supply current for operating home appliances, fans, motors and other electric components.

C. J. Wall, president of the Pioneer Natural Gas Co. of Amarillo, said:

"The thing that really seems to be on most people's minds here is the enormous potential these new developments and others like them offer to the industry for expanding its markets."

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI)—A segregationist who once said he would choose jail to integration and a newcomer from one of Alabama's most politically prominent families headed into a run-off for the governorship today.

Ex-Gov. James (Kissin' Jim) Folsom, making a comeback bid for an unprecedented third term, appeared doomed to defeat.

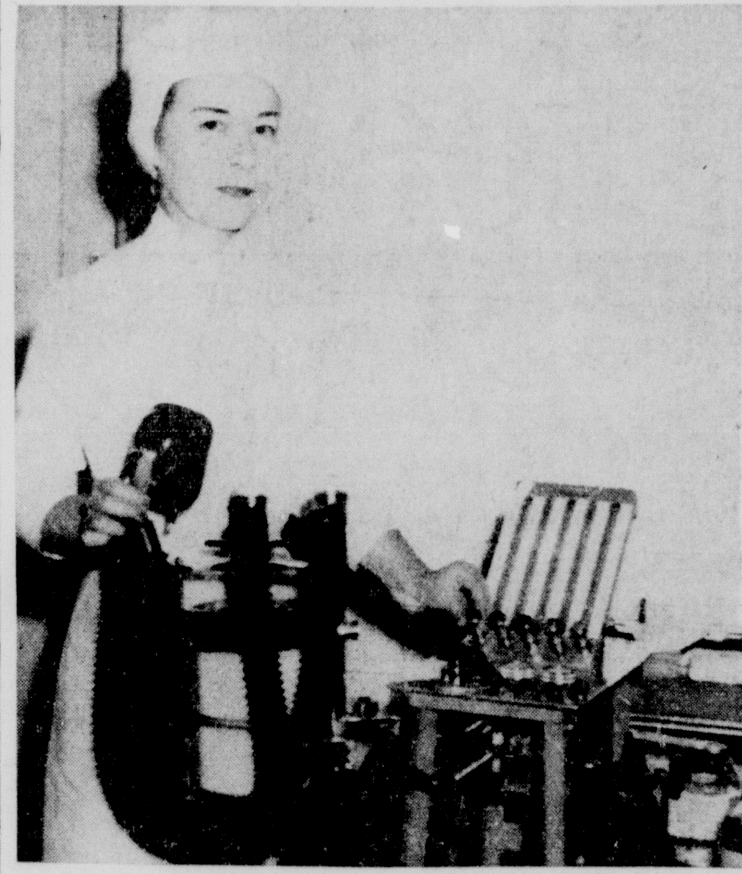
George E. Wallace, the segregationist, ex-circuit judge and one-time state featherweight boxing champion, and State Sen. Ryan DeGraffenried, the newcomer, were far ahead of Folsom in late returns.

The results apparently ended for the present the colorful dominance of the six-foot, eight-inch Folsom, who waged the most unusual campaign.

With 2,283 of the state's 3,688 boxes reporting, segregationist Wallace had 118,921 votes; DeGraffenried 101,502; Folsom 85,077; Eugene Bull Connor 14,677; MacDonald Gallion 50,790; Bruce Henderson 2,533; and Wayne Jennings 1,392.

Terrorists Start Algerian Rioting

ALGIERS, Algeria (UPI)—Terrorists blew up a booby-trapped automobile in the midst of a crowd of Moslem dock workers today, killing and wounding dozens and setting off violent Moslem rioting.

The blast was believed to be the work of the outlawed Secret Army Organization (OAS).

Police said at least eight were killed and 100 injured in the explosion. But they said the figures probably would rise sharply. One Moslem bystander (See RIOTING, page three)
