SEPTEMBER 2 IS DATE SET FOR FALL TERM OF SCHOOL

Gladewater Public Schools will open the 1969-70 school year on September 2. An annual pre-school workshop for teachers is scheduled for August 27-29. According to Supt. Roy Johnson, a number of significant changes will be made in program and organization when the new session begins. The school structure has been completely reorganized in order to meet the guide lines of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare for complete student desegregation by September of 1969.

As a result of this change, all Gladewater students in kindergarten through grade 2 will be assigned to Gay Avenue Primary School. This school will become a non-graded school in September. Teachers and administrators have been working for the past two years in preparation for this educational innovation.

Broadway Intermediate School will house students in grades 3-5.

The Gladewater Middle School, a new type of program and philosophy, will have students in grades 6-8. Secondary students in grades 9-12 will be enrolled at Gladewater High School.

Two new vocational programs have been approved for Gladewater High School and will be implemented when school begins. Auto-mechanics and building trades will be added to the high school curriculum. A new \$65,000 building to house these programs is currently being constructed and will be completed by the opening day of school. An initial input of some 60 students for these courses is expected.

Teacher Workshop Dates Announced

The annual Gladewater schools teacher workshop, set to commence Wednesday, August 27 and continue through Friday, August 29, will have a somewhat different schedule from past years.

After the first day's combined session covering many matters of interest to all teachers in general, teachers will disperse to their various school buildings to continue the "building workshops."

Director of Curriculum Bill Holliman indicated this year's workshop will contain a large amount of information for all professional staff members. There are 122 teachers in the Gladewater system.

A greenhouse to be used in this program is in the process of being built at this time. All school buildings have undergone extensive clean-up, paint-up, and fix-up care during the summer months in preparation for the new term.

Students who were in attendance in the Gladewater District last year have already been pre-registered. Students who will attend Gladewater Schools for the first time this year have been registering at all schools since August 1.

New Apartment Complex Under Construction

The first of four apartment buildings, each with four apartments is rapidly nearing completion on a site immediately adjacent to the Oak Manor Nursing Home.

The new apartments, actually four-plexes are being constructed by Gladewater builder A. B. McPherson and his son, Bobby. McPherson acquired the land, located just off East Broadway (Highway 80) directly behind the Hancock Clinic some time ago. The development is known as the West Lee Addition.

McPherson said each of the four separate brick veneer buildings will cost "about \$36,000." He said each apartment will have two bedrooms, kitchen with built-ins and a combination living-dining room. In addition, McPherson said each unit will be equipped with refrigerator and kitchen range.

All apartments will be completely air conditioned and centrally heated. Air conditioning units, he said, will be roof-mounted.

Other features include paneled rooms, attractive interior decor and yard care. McPherson said the apartments will rent for \$115 a month.

The two streets to the addition, Ames and Hancock, are staked off and will be completely paved, said McPherson.

New Records Set For Water Use

This extremely hot dry summer - nearly 30 days at or very near the 100 degrees mark - has produced new city records for amount of water used. On July 1, 2,315,000 gallons were consumed for a new one-day record.

The total pumpage for July was 44,761,500, a record for a single month.

City Water Filtration Plant superintendent Bobby Leach reported that 150 million gallons have been used in the city since January 1 to August 1. The total for last year was 183 million gallons. The annual total for this year should far exceed the 1968 figure, said Leach.

He also reported that the city water reservoir, Lake Gladewater, is down 18 inches but plenty of water is available for users here.

Coach Lyle Outlines '69 Bear Prospects

Gladewater High School head football coach John Lyle Thursday outlined for Rotarians the prospects for the upcoming season for the Bears, picked by many observers to win the District 14-AA crown. He was introduced by Don Audas.

Lyle and his assistant coaches last week completed the annual high school coaches clinic held in Dallas. Lyle, head coach here since 1965, said the appointment of Anthony Bryant this week completed his staff. Working with Lyle as assistants will be Jack Murphy, Jack James, Bryant, and Walter Derrick, who moves to GHS from Weldon where he was football coach. Other coaches on the Gladewater school system staff are Oliver Sorrells and Richard Fenton at the Middle school. James and Bryant replaced former coaches Hugh Mixon, now a counselor and Ernest Allen, who resigned to enter private business.

Going over the rugged Bears schedule, Lyle called attention to the open date October 18, the first for Gladewater High School in some years. He expressed a distaste for open dates and said numerous attempts were made to avoid the mid-season opening. Tight scheduling, he said, allows high schools only 10 playing dates with little leeway. The Bears posted a solid 8-2-0 record last year.

Lyle looked over each GHS game and discussed some of the high points of the teams. He also reminded Rotarians that the Bears have 13 lettermen back.

Wills Point, whom the Bears whipped last year 46-15, looks much stronger to Lyle. The Bears will meet Wills Point here Sept. 12 in the season opener. He felt the experience gained by the young Wills Point club last year will make them tough this year.

Mineola, whom the Bears will face Sept. 19, lost some of their best, said Lyle, but looks strong as last year. The Bruins bested the yellowjackets 25-6 last year, and will meet them on their home grounds this season.

A new opponent, Canton, will come to the Bruins' home gridiron on Sept. 26. Lyle said the club has a new coach and the team was hurt by graduation
