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## **Good Shepherd lease** is renewed to 2012

Good Shepherd Hospital was with six observation rooms in revised and renewed to April 15, the same area and an expansion 2012 by Gregg County of the intensive care-coronary Commissioners Friday. The action was taken to permit a \$5.8 million expansion of the hospital's facilities.

The county-owned hospital is leased to Good Shepherd Hospital, Inc., a non-profit corporation. Five million, eight hundred and fifty thousand dollars in revenue bonds will be issued to finance the expansion. Hospital Administrator Wilson Stinnett said the expansion includes seven

## HUD considering modernization of two public housing projects

Bright was told, "The Executive Director (Mrs. Barker) needs cooperation from the tenants, you, the other Board members, City officials, the Justice of the Peace, and the Local Constable to correct one Authority problem. A very few irresponsible tenants are damaging the projects and are creating problems for their neighbors by poor habits. A positive approach should be taken to eliminate this problem. All tenants and particularly the

encouraged to pay their rents when due, to keep the units clean and not destroy any part of their apartments, and to conduct themselves quietly in such a way as not to disturb their neighbors. Those residents who wish to improve the neighborhood must support the Executive Director as she tries to enforce the law. Under the Community Development and Housing Act of 1974 the Local Housing Authority was given the responsibility and authority to start eviction proceedings on

any resident who does not pay his rent, who wilfully destroys his apartment, or who causes discomfort or harm to his neighbors. The purpose of the stringent 1974 housing act is not to harrass anyone but to make projects a good neighborhood of responsible people. This purpose can be achieved anly through the cooperation of all concerned." Mrs. Barker said a number of

apartments have been badly damaged and vandalized and for this reason cannot be rented until they are made habitable.

She also said even though HUD is considering the modernization, if and when the work is approved, it could be as long as a year before actual work would begin.

There isn't enough money in operating funds to do more than the most necessary repairs. Mrs. Barker applauded the more stringent law which would permit the Authority to evict less than desirable tenants.

Low-rent housing is designed to help those individuals and families who would otherwise years.

not be able to afford any kind of suitable homes. Average rent is \$44.43 per month; this goes from as low as 5 per cent of income to as much as \$121 per month. Amount of rent is determined by income and number of persons in a family. The 5 per cent of income (which in one instance here makes the rent \$13 per month) applies mainly to a woman on AFDC - one with dependent children.
